Hips, Shoulders, Knees and Woes!

Joint pain is normal as we age. ROSA

Due to the rising need for orthopedics care in the region, Astera Health has made investments in staff, equipment, and robotics. In 2023, the orthopedics staff began using the ROSA Knee System. This surgeon-assisted robot is designed to make knee surgery precise and efficient. In many cases, using the ROSA knee system improved overall care and accelerated recovery. This amazing tool will be discussed in detail at the event.

Patricia Knudtson: Courageous and Cancer Free!

Patricia Knudtson immediately saw the need for the facility as she was going through her own cancer journey. Without hesitation, she became the very first donor to the project. Specifically, her donation went toward one of the eight infusion bays where cancer patients will receive lifesaving treatments in their battle with cancer.


Patricia or Patt as her friends and family call her, is a retired home economics teacher for the Wadena-Deer Creek School District. Patt has had a long and arduous struggle with cancer that has taken her across the state, from Astera Health to the Mayo Clinic. Her cancer journey started with a breast cancer lumpectomy. Nine months later the genetic testing showed she carried the BCRA2 gene which led to a double mastectomy.

After recovering from her first bout with triple negative breast cancer, Patt received more unfortunate news. After experiencing some intense back pain, it was discovered Patt had pancreatic cancer. Mutations of the BRCA2 gene can often lead to pancreatic cancer. So again, Patt battled cancer. According to the Pancreatic Cancer Action Network, this form of cancer has a 13 percent survival rate. She received a great deal of her care at Astera Health in the infusion department. After many months, Patt was declared cancer-free on January 28, 2025.

Patt applauded the care she received at Astera Health and profusely thanked the oncology staff for helping her through the long journey. "They really give you the care you need," she commented. Patients are never forgotten at Astera Health and anyone needing help is promptly assisted in any way possible. Patt encourages anyone with the means to donate their time or funds to this amazing project. Their contributions go a long way in helping those with cancer.

Construction Update

In only a few short months, the new cancer center will be open. After a relatively short construction phase, the state-of-the-art facility will welcome its first patients on July 14, 2025.

Thanks to favorable weather and optimal building conditions, the construction process has been smooth and successful. During the final stretch of winter, Mortenson Construction completed interior finishes, paving the way for the next phase of construction. In April, crews added the final touches that transform an empty space into a healing environment. Key medical equipment, including the linear accelerator, used to pinpoint radiation to the site of cancer, and the PET/CT scanner, used to detect cancer, also arrive. This scanning is currently offered at Astera Health on a mobile unit.

Volunteering enriches both patients and volunteers. It fosters purpose, friendships, and skill development while also reducing stress, lowering depression risk, and boosting wellbeing.



Medicare Advantage Hurting more than helping?

Medicare vs. Medicare Advantage

Medicare is a health program operated by the government. Original Medicare (Parts A & B) helps pay for hospital stays and doctor visits, but you need to buy a separate plan for prescriptions and extra coverage.

Medicare Advantage (Part C) is offered by private companies contractually receiving funds from the government to provide you medical care. This includes hospital, doctor visits, and often drug coverage, plus extras like dental and vision. Original Medicare lets you see any doctor, while Medicare Advantage has lower costs but limits you to certain doctors and hospitals.

Medicare Advantage plans often come with cheaper premiums, convincing many to drop traditional Medicare for additional savings. However, this typically leads to lapses in coverage, leaving some patients without the care they need.

Problems for rural hospitals and their patients

- » **Lower payments for hospitals:** Rural hospitals are reimbursed 10 percent less from Advantage plans than from regular Medicare. Some hospitals get 15 percent less.
- » Patients stay in hospitals longer: Medicare Advantage patients stay 10 percent longer because of insurance rules that slow down their transfer to the right care.
- » **Too much paperwork, delayed care:** 80 percent of providers say they have more paperwork, like prior authorizations (insurance approvals before treatment). Many say this leads to delays or denials of important care.
- » Not receiving the proper care: Many Advantage patients are denied necessary treatments. What does this mean for rural communities?
- » **Out of network costs:** Patients may experience higher out of pocket costs if their Medicare Advantage plan is out of network.

The American Hospital Association says rural hospitals are in danger, and changes are needed now to continue to serve their communities. Astera Health is among many of the hospital systems affected. Kim Aagard, Chief Financial Officer says, "Be careful when choosing to give up your Medicare benefits. With some of these plans you may be paying less, but it is not clearly understood what you may be giving up, or what hurdles are to be overcome just to receive care. Medicare Advantage offers coverage at a lower cost which often means less coverage. Some patients that require extended hospital stays, nursing home stays, or some oncology services are being denied payment for their care simply because they are on Medicare Advantage. This care in most cases would be covered if they had not given up their Medicare rights to go with the lower premium."
